Response: Information is sent home to parents in a variety of ways. The primary delivery method for communicating with parents is the DCPS School Messenger and school outside bulletin board. Monthly newsletters and flyers about upcoming events are also methods that will be used to communicate to parents. In addition, we use the school's website to keep parents informed. Each teacher has a website in which they post current information about events occurring in their classrooms. In addition in the monthly newsletter each grade level explicitly states what academic concept to be taught

during reading, writing, math, and science throughout the month. At any time parents can request a parent/teacher conference with their child's teacher in order to discuss their child's education.
