The Florida Seal of Biliteracy



The **Florida Seal of Biliteracy** Program is established to recognize a high school graduate who has attained a high level of competency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more foreign languages in addition to English.

To apply for the Seal of Biliteracy, follow these three steps:

STEP 1: Complete the application.

Applications are due by Friday, March 8, 2024.

STEP 2: Choose a path for qualification: Path A–Language Courses, Path B–Exam, or Path C-Portfolio See pages 2 – 5 of this flyer for detailed descriptions of each.

STEP 3: Submit evidence of your qualifications on the 2023 Seal of Biliteracy (SoBL) Team for your chosen path. Go to **Teams** > click on **Join or Create Team** >

Pathways toward the Seal of Biliteracy

PATH A: Language Courses

In the Path A – Language Courses channel of the Seal of Biliteracy Team, please attach your transcript that shows the grades you made in four different high school courses of the same language. (You may currently be enrolled in your fourth year of language.) See instructions in Teams.

- The SILVER SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma AND has earned four (4) world language course credits in the same world language with a cumulative 3.0 grade point average or higher on a 4.0 scale (unweighted) in those courses. (At time of application submission, the applicant's world language GPA should be a 3.0. It will be verified again after the third quarter and at the end of the year by your school counselor and by the district office.)
- The GOLD SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma with a level 4 or higher on the Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) Florida Standards Assessment (FSA), AND has earned four (4) world language course credits in the same world language with a cumulative 3.0 grade point average or higher on a 4.0 scale (unweighted) in those courses. (At time of application submission, the applicant's world language GPA should be a 3.0. It will be verified again after the third quarter and at the end of the year by your school counselor and by the district office.)

PATH B: Passing Exam Scores

In the Path B – Exam channel of our Seal of Biliteracy Team, please attach the score report of your passing exam score.

- The SILVER SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma AND has earned a Silver Seal score or performance level on any of the exams found in the following chart.
- The GOLD SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma with a level 4 or higher on the Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) AND has earned a Gold Seal score or performance level on any of the exams found in the following chart.

Students who did not enroll in, or complete, world language courses, shall be awarded up to four world language high school course credits upon attaining at least the minimum Silver Seal score or performance level on one of the nationally recognized exams above.

PATH C: Portfolio

When an exam or courses are not available, a portfolio may be submitted on Teams. See the Seal of Biliteracy Portfolio Requirements below and on the next page.

- The SILVER SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma AND has demonstrated language proficiency through maintenance of a portfolio of language performance at the Intermediate Mid-level or higher based on the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines 2012 in the modes of communication appropriate for that language (when an exam is not available). See the following portfolio requirements.
- The GOLD SEAL of Biliteracy requires that the student has earned a standard high school diploma with a level 4 or higher on the Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) AND has demonstrated language proficiency through maintenance of a portfolio of language performance at the Advanced Low level or higher based on the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines 2012 in the modes of communication appropriate for that language (when an exam is not available). See the following portfolio requirements.

Seal of Biliteracy Portfolio Requirements

The portfolio consists of five sections plus the honor agreement described below. **All five** sections plus the honor agreement must be completed and submitted electronically on Teams by **Friday**, **March 8th**, **2024**..

Please name your files using the following naming convention before submitting them electronically:

The Five Sections of the Portfolio

- 1. <u>Interpretive Listening</u>: Written summary (100-150 words) in the target language of key ideas from an authentic* audio or video in the target language that is at least 2 minutes in length. *Link to audio or video must be appended. Songs and music videos do not qualify.*
- 2. <u>Interpretive Reading</u>: Written retelling (100-150 words) in the target language of key ideas from an authentic* text written in the target language. Authentic* text must be appended. Literature (fiction and non-fiction) and articles from periodicals are accepted. Music lyrics do not qualify.
- 3. <u>Interpersonal Communication</u>: Recording (2 minutes) submitted in .mp3 format of student speaking in an extemporaneous conversation with another speaker of the language. *Topic for conversation***: Discuss the solution to a problem at your school, in your neighborhood or in your city. What could community leaders do? What could you do? State the problem and then elaborate on the solution. Each speaker should introduce himself/herself before beginning.
- 4. <u>Presentational Speaking</u>: Recording (2 minutes) submitted in .mp3 format of student speaking in a prepared presentation in the target language (may NOT be read). **Topics for Presentational Speaking (choose 1 topic)**:** <u>Topic A.</u> Explain what brought you to this point in your life where you are now graduating from your high school and applying for the Seal of Biliteracy. Did other people help you along the way? Are you self-motivated? Is it a combination of these factors? You may describe the process or tell a story that was a turning point for you. **OR** <u>Topic B.</u> Tell about an important historical event that happened in another country or in the U.S. Explain what happened and why it was significant. What were the long-term effects of this event? Does it still affect us today?
- 5. <u>Presentational Writing</u>: 5 paragraph essay submitted in target language, written without use of resources (dictionary, thesaurus, etc.). *Topics for Presentational Writing (choose 1 topic)***: <u>Topic A.</u> Tell about your goals for the future and how you will achieve them. **OR** <u>Topic B.</u> Discuss the future plans of a local business (may be true or fictional).
