

ROSTER VERIFICATION

Florida law provides instructional personnel the right to review their class rosters for accuracy and to correct any mistakes relating to the identity of students for whom the individual teacher will be held responsible on his/her 2021-2022 performance evaluation. This verification will occur through **MyAccountability**, an online application developed by the Information Management Department.

Beginning Monday, October 25, 2021, through Monday, November 1, 2021 each teacher should review their student lists in the "MyAccountability" application and complete the attached form verifying the accuracy of the students that were assigned to his/her roster during the week of October 11-15, 2021 (FTE Survey 2) and report any discrepancies to the school's Data Entry Clerk, Ms. Johnson, by COB November 1.



Standards for the Week





Mathematics

Course	Standard(s) to be covered this week
ALG 1A	Solve linear equations and inequalities in one variable, including equations with coefficients represented by letters.
ALGEBRA 1	Interpret the slope (rate of change) and the intercept (constant term) of a linear model in the context of the data. Write a function that describes a relationship between two quantities. a. Determine an explicit expression, a recursive process, or steps for calculation from a context.
MATH COLL READ	Interpret expressions that represent a quantity in terms of its context. <u>*</u> a. Interpret parts of an expression, such as terms, factors, and coefficients. Choose and produce an equivalent form of an expression to reveal and explain properties of the quantity represented by the expression.
GEOM	Verify experimentally the properties of dilations given by a center and a scale factor: a. A dilation takes a line not passing through the center of the dilation to a parallel line and leaves a line passing through the center unchanged. b. The dilation of a line segment is longer or shorter in the ratio given by the scale factor.
ALGEBRA 2	Know there is a complex number i such that $i^2 = -1$, and every complex number has the form a + bi with a and b real. Use the relation $i^2 = -1$ and the commutative, associative, and distributive properties to add, subtract, and multiply complex numbers.
PRE- CALC	Understand that rational expressions form a system analogous to the rational numbers, closed under addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division by a nonzero rational expression; add, subtract, multiply, and divide rational expressions.



Sciences

Course	Standard(s) to be covered this week
INTEG SCI	Explore the scientific theory of atoms (also known as atomic theory) by describing changes in the atomic model over time and why those changes were necessitated by experimental evidence.
ENV SCI	Analyze how population size is determined by births, deaths, immigration, emigration, and limiting factors (biotic and abiotic) that determine carrying capacity. Discuss the characteristics of populations, such as number of individuals, age structure, density, and pattern of distribution.
BIOLOGY	Describe the process of meiosis, including independent assortment and crossing over. Explain how reduction division results in the formation of haploid gametes or spores.
CHEMISTRY	Characterize types of chemical reactions, for example: redox, acid-base, synthesis, and single and double replacement reactions.
PHYSICS	Interpret and apply Newton's three laws of motion.



Language Arts

Course	Standard(s) to be covered this week
ENG 1	Delineate and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, assessing whether the reasoning is valid, and the evidence is relevant and sufficient; identify false statements and fallacious reasoning.
ENG 2	Determine a central idea of a text and analyze its development over the course of the text, including how it emerges and is shaped and refined by specific details; provide an objective summary of the text.
ENG 3	Delineate and evaluate the reasoning in seminal U.S. texts, including the application of constitutional principles and use of legal reasoning (e.g., in U.S. Supreme Court majority opinions and dissents), and the premises, purposes, and arguments in works of public advocacy (e.g., The Federalist, presidential addresses)
ENG 4	Determine two or more themes or central ideas of a text and analyze their development over the course of the text, including how they interact and build on one another to produce a complex account; provide an objective summary of the text
READING	Cite strong and thorough textual evidence to support analysis of what the text says explicitly as well as inferences drawn from the text.

Job Summary

Provides support in assigned school health room within the Duval County Public School System under the indirect supervision of the Technical Manager, Nursing. Provides first aid to students, performs student specific health services, maintains school health records, and assists with screenings.

Essential Functions

- 1. Provides basic first aid and attends to student health needs as indicated in the School Health Services Manual. Performs clerical duties including creating and updating records, reports, and filing; telephoning; routine referrals; and follow-up activities as instructed by supervising nurse.
- 2. Distributes and/or administers prescription and non-prescription medication to students in accordance with Section 1006.062 F.S., and guidelines described in the School Health Services Manual and upon receiving training through or by the school district.
- 3. May be required to perform routine non-invasive medical care and specific health services upon successful completion of face to face student specific training provided by a Registered Nurse. Health services include, but are not limited to, diabetic glucose monitoring and calculating carbohydrate counts; administering of medication via nebulizer; use of a magnet over a vagus nerve stimulator (VNS) to control seizures; and/or administration of emergency medication.
- 4. Maintains current school health records and clinic logs. Updates student health information and ensures health records are maintained in a confidential manner.
- 5. Assists the student, school personnel, and parents in understanding and coping with a student's disability or condition.
- 6. Assists and gathers records and reports for statistical data relating to health concerns and nursing service.
- 7. Facilitate Telehealth appointments for students.
- 8. Supports district and school-based wellness initiatives and performs other duties as assigned.
